Alumni Foundation Treasurer and Class of '60 graduate, winning the school's highest, academic honor—the Balfour Plaque, Randy Hall passed away suddenly, from a stroke, on November 6, 2015. While at Lake Worth High School, Randy held numerous leadership roles, played football and basketball and made many, lifelong friends. After earning a Chemical Engineering degree from Princeton University in 1964, he spent 13 years as a

high-level employee at Proctor and Gamble, in Ohio. Then, in 1977, he moved to California and began working for the Clorox Corporation. Returning to Lake Worth in 1982, Randy joined the family businesses—Modern Venetian Blind Corporation and Lance Awning, Inc. There he remained until retiring in 2000.

Randy was a Board Member and treasurer of the Lake Worth High School Alumni Foundation. In that capacity, he spearheaded the Alumni Foundation's drive to donate 10 computers to the Guidance Department to assist students with career and college research. With an email address of Travelperson, Randy loved to travel, especially car travel. He took many driving trips all around the United States and Canada.

Randy married a New Jersey girl, Mary Lou, in 1964. They had two daughters, Cyndy Othus and Andrea Duenas, both of whom graduated from Lake Worth High. He also had two grandchildren, Lena and Randy Duenas.

Randy gave great guidance to the LWHS Alumni Foundation, especially in the field of finances. His leadership will be sorely missed

MaryAnne Hedrick-Chief Fundraiser for Barry Grunow Memorial Scholarship

"Barry Grunow's students were excited about learning every day they stepped into his classroom," according to MaryAnne Hedrick, Dollars for Scholars Board Member, friend of fellow teacher, the late Barry Grunow, and number one fundraiser for the future teachers' Barry Grunow Memorial Scholarship. So, how did a scholarship for the murdered Lake Worth Middle School teacher, Barry Grunow, fall under the purview of Lake Worth High School's Dollars for Scholars program? Who is MaryAnne Hedrick, and how is the scholarship doing currently? Let's find out!

To begin, the main person behind the fundraiser for the past four years is MaryAnne Hedrick. A Physical Education teacher for "26 happy years" at Lake Worth Middle School, she suffered an unfortunate rollover, car accident on I-95 in 1998 and, according to her, "It was a long road back... but I survived." Now in a wheelchair with a beautiful, black Lab service dog, Jac, she's still teaching Physical Education at same school. During her recovery, the school's former Principal, Sharon Walker, told MaryAnne that her job was secure, and if she wanted to teach a different subject she could earn a new certification; however, MaryAnne answered, "I don't want to teach anything else." After a struggle to heal, she was back to school and still teaching PE, with the help of her service dog, Jac. She smiled, "My anymore."

A popular, young Language Arts teacher and basketball coach, Barry Grunow, married, with two young children, would

"dress up to fit the roles of books he had his students read," according to MaryAnne. Tragically, in 2,000 he was killed by a straight "A" student, Nathaniel Brazil, on the last day of school—in fact, the last five minutes. The student had been suspended earlier in the day, came back, sneaked into the school and shot his beloved teacher, Barry Grunow, dead. MaryAnne acknowledged, "It was very scary!" The student is now in a Florida prison.

The beginnings of the scholarship are complex. Lake Worth Middle School teachers got the idea for a scholarship first. As the idea started to grow, Jody Gleason, Palm Beach School Board Chairman, and former County Commissioner Warren Newell came up with a plan to donate their unused campaign funds to the establishment of the scholarship. They encouraged other politicians to do the same. Realizing that Dave Cantley had started Dollars for Scholars in 1998 at Lake Worth High School for students adore Jac. I don't exist their deserving students in need, Jody asked Dave if Dollars for Scholars would take over administering the Barry Grunow scholarship. That Board met, changed their bylaws and finalized the for-

mation of the Barry Grunow Memorial Scholarship, awarded annually county-wide, to deserving public, private or parochial high school graduates showing financial need and pursuing teaching careers. Dave's Last Resort's owner, Dave Palombo, raised money at a golf tournament, applying it toward the scholarship. Students from Lake Worth Middle School also raised money for their beloved teacher's memorial. Garth Rosenkrantz, along with other friends of Barry's, organized a Barry Grunow Three-on-Three Basketball Tournament. Over five years' time, they raised close to \$85,000 for the scholarship.

However, the scholarship started to wane after a while. Fortunately, it's now in good hands with MaryAnne, who says that last year they held a 5K Run, as well as a Golf Tournament at PGA National Golf Course. At the Awards Ceremony last May, six scholarships were presented: One for \$3,000, one for \$2,000 and four for \$1,000 each. Friends of Barry helped MaryAnne at this year's fundraiser—a Golf Tournament at PGA National. It raised more than \$9,000. Well, now you know the rest of the story; you've met MaryAnne Hedrick, you know all about the Barry Grunow Memorial Scholarship and you know its current status. Since its beginning in 2,000, the scholarship has raised and given \$156,250 to 105 future teachers. When asked how she feels about Barry's memorial scholarship and why she works so hard on it every year, MaryAnne thought a minute, and then said, "I do it so that his children and his wife know that his memory will always stay alive."

We'll learn how she went on to graduate from the University of Florida and land a dream job back home in Palm Beach County—in Boca Raton—with a medical software company. Let me explain.

Now, about this 4th Generation thing—it's true! Denise graduated from Lake Worth High School in 2011. Her mother, Belle Bailey Aherne, graduated in the Class of 1992; her grandmother, the late Jan Hall Bailey, graduated with the Class of 1964, and her great-grandmother, the late Marjorie Swain Hall, graduated with the Class of 1936. There you have it! A family full of smart-as-awhip young women ready to take on the world. Actually, Marjorie's father, Ernest Swain, founded the city of Greenacres and her uncle, L.C. Denise had an excellent education at Lake Worth High School. Being in its Medical Sci-


Actually, the Dollars for Scholarship she received helped her so much at the University of Florida. Her first semester of college was the summer right after graduation. Denise said, "The scholarship paid for a large chunk of it. It definitely helped and I'm grateful." She majored in Journalism and minored in Leadership and Business. She admitted, "The reason I chose journalism over English, as a major, was that studying journalism opened more doors for me. I worked in a newsroom the last year of college." It was a University of Florida journalism training center—WUFT: a TV, Radio and Web epicenter. Denise was involved in the TV and Web part of it. She confided, "Being in a busy environment, learning about rough draft to final, publicized version was an important process to understand. It taught me a lot." She commu-

She insists, "Without my college education at the University of Florida and without the Internship that I got, I'd not have the job I have now." Her title at her new job is Content Specialist. In that capacity, Denise has to edit and do revisions on any document leaving the business that clients will see, to make sure they have the Modernizing Medicine "voice." That sounds like a mighty significant assignment. When asked what she likes best about her new job, she points out, "I like the busy environment, and always having something important to do: A document to be revised, a project to work on or a meeting to go to. Also, it's a very friendly environment."




My Fond Memories of **LWHS**



Ron Schutta and I had tickets to the Eissey Theater to hear "Bob Hoose Sings Sinatra". Little did I know as we sat in our seats that night, I would have another goal in my life before we left the theater. I thought that we were only going to a concert to enjoy the music that we both love.

Prior to the show, we did not know that part of the proceeds that night were being donated to an organization called the Honor Flight. (Bob Hoose actually donated his entire fee for the concert). During the intermission, Todd Tucker from the Honor Flight came out on stage to tell us about this organization that is based in Stuart.

This is the group that raises monies to fly the veterans from WWII to Washington, DC for one day, all expenses paid. Prior to his talk, I did not remember hearing of the Honor Flight before. However, after talking to Todd in the lobby after the show, I knew that I had to join the group to honor the memory of my husband, Tommy and my dad, Horace, who served in the Navy and Coast Guard, respectively during WWII.

What a rewarding decision I made that night!!!

Since then, I have been a "hostess" at two flights at PBIA. (By the time you read this, I will have had the honor to be at another Homecoming on 10/24/15). These men and women who gave their all so that we would not be speaking German or would not be here at all. It is a great honor.



Dollars for **Scholars Record** Breaking Year, Nears 1 Million!

This could be a record breaking year for our scholarship awards as we are nearing the one million dollar mark. The class of 2015 received \$68,000, bringing the total amount to \$903,000 since our first year, 1999.

Maryanne Hedrick, director of The Barry Grunow Golf Tournament reports the tournament held October 10 at The Arnold Palmer Course at The PGA National Golf Course netted a little over \$9,000. The helicopter ball drop winner took home a check for \$835.00. The original DFS tournament sponsored by The LW High Alumni Foundation was held at The Atlantis Country Club on November 14. Vicki Rautbord, Tournament Director, reported a net profit of \$6,115.35.

We are the recipient of \$15,161 from the school's internal accounts generated by donations to faculty members and former students who are deceased. The money was donated in their memory at the time of their death and has been in the school's internal accounts for many years. All of the accounts, except one, was set up before I became principal in 1980.
