

# The Great Charity Challenge

The Lake Worth Dollars for Scholars Foundation is again going to place their name in the barrel and hope to have their name drawn as one of the three dozen nonprofit organizations competing in the Great Charity Challenge (GCC).

On Saturday evening, December 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2017, all but two names will be drawn at the Wellington Equestrian Center. The GCC sponsors donate between \$1.5-2 million to be given to local charities. If a nonprofit's name is drawn, the minimum they receive is \$15,000. The winner is presented with a check for \$150,000.

On Saturday evening, February 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2018, each nonprofit that has been picked, plus the two chosen that evening, are randomly paired with three person equestrian jumper teams. The team that Charity Challenge!

completes the obstacle course in the fastest time takes home the \$150,000. The other participants' teams, depending on their standing, earn various amounts ending with \$15,000 for last place.

It's all very festive with horses and riders taking part in a theme driven costume contest and another opportunity for the nonprofits to win additional monies. It's a fun and FREE evening. Mass parking is off South Shore Blvd. and bus transportation is provided or parking for a fee is available at the Wellington Equestrian Center. Come out on Dec 2<sup>nd</sup> to see if Lake Worth Dollars for Scholars name is drawn. Additionally, that night you'll get to see some jumpers in action. 
# LWHS's Master Musician: John Weatherspoon

When asked what one word might cover his feelings about Lake Worth High School—John Weatherspoon, Choral Director for the Trojan Pride Chorus for the past 25 years—answered, "Passion." He explained, "I see these students beyond where they see themselves. There are so many people who don't believe in our type of students. I believe in them beyond where they are, and I am pushing them to be more than they think they can be."

According to Weatherspoon, "I got into vocal music as a career, since my high school choral director, Dr. Brenda Williams Walker, helped me discover my gift in this field and allowed me to serve as our student conductor. I liked it a lot." He continued, "Earlier, my middle school choral director had called asking me to join her chorus because she liked my voice. It gave me a feeling of belonging. Then, the high school director gave me more focus and showed care for me as a person. I knew in 11th grade that that's what I wanted to do as a career. That same director poured into me a desire to be better and be a better performer, as well as to care for other people." Weatherspoon shared, "A student once asked me why I chose Lake Worth High School to work at. I answered that my background matches some of what students deal with. I can relate to that."

He was born and raised in Baton Rouge, Louisiana; his mother reared seven children, basically alone. She worked at a hospital, starting in housekeeping, working her way up and studying whatever way she could. Finally, she became a nurse's-aid working in Intensive his wife and four children. Al-



Care. Two weeks after Weatherspoon's high school graduation, he was in Marine Corps Boot Camp in San Diego, California. Actually, he remained in the Marine Corps Reserves until 1992, when he began working at LWHS. After the service, he earned a Bachelor's degree in Music Education from Southeastern Louisiana University. In fact, he met his wife, Althea, there. At graduation he met Marcia Andrews, a current Palm Beach District School Board Member, who was working as a recruiter for the school district. He came to Palm Beach County and worked for two years as a music teacher at Seminole Trails Elementary School; in fact, he liked the principal, Dr. Ken Carleton, so much that they played tennis together. "He was awesome!" Weatherspoon said. Moving on, deciding to try for a high school music position, he called Lake Worth High School. Principal Dave Cantley answered the phone; John was hired after the interview. Moving on he attended FAU and earned his Master of Arts degree in Choral Conducting.





# Wayne Falbey: LWHS Class of 1960

Wayne graduated in 1960 from LWHS, then graduated in the charter class at USF with a dual major in History and Political Science. Three years later he graduated from Vanderbilt University School of Law, then returned to Palm Beach County to practice law in Boca Raton. Wayne says he wasn't happy about the way the East Coast was developing, so he and his wife left in 1970 and moved to Fort Myers. They were divorced years later after which he moved to Naples, where he currently resides. Along the way he earned his MBA as well as a dual Doctorate in Management and Marketing. He also met the love of his life, Phyllis Ann who he affectionately calls Annie.

"The truth is...Wayne says, I didn't suit him, so he left. just really wanted the law background for real estate development." So after 20 years in law, including representing 3 of the Fortune Top 50 companies, he went over to the "dark side" as he refers to it, and became a real estate developer.

Eventually a friend who was dean of a graduate school of business on the East Coast called him one day. He was trying to get some major developers to contribute to the school, but they wanted something that



benefited them in return. Wayne agreed to establish a Master of Science program in real estate development. It became the most talked about and copied program of its kind in the country! Unfortunately the dean got fired 5 years later. Wayne didn't want to break in a new dean, and the politics of academia

never wanted to practice law. I He had always gotten high marks in the creative writing and essay aspects of English courses at LWHS and USF, and had wanted to be a writer since the fifth or sixth grade. As a senior at LWHS, he had Mr Goodell as his English teacher. He was a tough customer according to Wayne, but he encouraged him to pursue his writing ambitions. A few years later, when Wayne was in Law School and bored he wrote his first novel, "The Quixotics." A Senior VP at Harper & Row liked it and asked him

to make a single change along with replacing his protagonist with a dweeb. Why? Because the VP thought readers didn't like anti-heroes. Wayne lost faith in traditional publishing and after 5 years of experience in academia, he began writing Sleeping Dogs: The Awakening, the first book in his Sleeping Dogs series of political/espionage thrillers. The plots are drawn from the headlines and delve international intrigue and global geopolitics.

There are now 4 books in the series. The latest, *Dog of War*, was published on July 4th of this year.

Along the way, Wayne has achieved international bestseller status and his books have been ranked #1 on Amazon's political thriller list. The books follow the exploits of a deadly band of hunter-killer black cops who track down and terminate America's enemies-foreign and domestic. The inestimable Lee Child has said that Wayne's books are "beautifully written" and are the kind of book he would write (are you listening Jack Reacher?) and read. Child's currently reading Dogs of War.

Asking Wayne what he enjoys most about his life, his reply: "I enjoy writing the most and plan to continue the series."

Look for book 5 in the series sometime next year.



#### **LWHS Graduate Success Story:**

Bethesda-by-the-Sea Mentoring Program Pays Off With Scholarship Opportunity

Years of mentoring by members of The Episcopal Church of Bethesda-by-the-Sea paid off when participating students recently graduated from Lake Worth Community High School, bound for promising college programs.

Joezer Pascal, the son of Haitian immigrants and one of a family of nine children, is headed to Vanderbilt University on a scholarship to study electrical engineering. He has been mentored since 2014 by Tanner Rose, a Bethesda member and former chairman of the Planning & Zoning Commission.

Rose attended Pascal's graduation May 19th and found it both emotional and rewarding.

"Sitting there with 600 graduates and the parents, I heard Joezer give a beautiful address, very well thought-through and very well-projected," said Rose, who described Pascal as "an caught the attention of a high absolute sponge" during their mentoring sessions.

Bethesda's Outreach Ministry members suggested Rose get involved in the mentoring program. After meeting Pascal as a sophomore, Rose decided he needed help with science, technology and math. A tutor was found to assist him in those areas, but Rose wanted to expose him to the arts, too.


"I was an English major. I carved out things to work with Joezer like grammar, writing, working on syntax and vocabulary," Rose said. "I gave him books to read and asked him to do a report. We'd discuss classic architecture, classic literature, or art history and archaeology.

We had a lot of discussions about history and art, and I think that helped him do well on the reading side of his SAT."

The Bethesda mentoring program—which works with about 10 at-risk high school students in grades 10 through 12—partners with another organization of poverty for low-income academically qualified students by providing opportunities for a post-secondary education," according to its website.

If we don't give people like Joezer the chance to go to college and get an education, we'll be the ones who lose."

As a sophomore, Pascal administrator, school described him as "a drifting vouth," said Reichenbacher. "He was bright, but he wasn't focused and didn't have a goal. Tanner made sure Joezer learned about the classics, antiquities and history. Our members aren't there to tutor, they're there to talk about other things and make the student a well-rounded person. 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
