100 Years ... a

Alumni Foundation members, LWHS staff and faculty, DFS supporters join to cheer a century of Trojan history

The rain didn't dampen the school spirit as the Lake Worth High School Alumni Foundation partied like it was 1999.

More than 100 graduates, faculty, local dignitaries and supporters filled the Lake Worth Casino Ballroom on Sept. 17 to celebrate the centennial of the school, which opened on Sept. 18, 1922.

The Junior ROTC opened the action, presenting the colors for the Pledge of Allegiance, led by Alumni News Editor Ann Carter (1972). Alumni Foundation President Jessica Latour (2002) emceed as Maggie Shamo Witherow (1949) led the invocation.

LWHS Alumni Foundation founder and former LWHS principal David Cantley ran through the high points of the school's history, emphasizing that details could be found in Lake Worth High School: A History, by the late Bill McGoun (1956).

The dinner buffet was accompa-



nied by music from the Trojan
Pride chorus and the Trojan Sound
marching band, all punctuated by
raffle drawings of gifts of all kinds
for places across the state.
Once the DJ started pushing the
tunes, the dance floor was seldom
empty. Current LWHS Principal Elena Villani and her cousin
wowed us with their salsa dancing.

Local dignitaries included School Board member Erica Whitfield, Lake Worth Mayor Betty Resch, vice mayor Christopher McVoy, commissioners Kimberly Stokes (class of 1999) and Reinaldo Diaz and also the city manager, Carmen Davis.

The weekend started with a Sept. 16 happy hour at Irish Brigade on Lake Avenue at K Street. (A 100th anniversary T-shirt if you tell me what was in that location when you were at LWHS.) Faculty and staff were the first arrivals, Manouchka Lovanice pointing out that she graduated in 1994, I graduated in 1972, so we were 22 twins, the difference in our graduation years. Manoushka teaches math at LWHS.

Carol Webster brought her group from the class of 1966, and

Mike Smith (1978) and Jill Riseley-Lager (1980) kicked it up a notch. The group was talking like we left school last week, when Dr. Tiffany Cox and the Trojan Sound drum line marched in. The band was getting ready for competition the next week. My count of the attendance was about 60-75 alumni, faculty and staff. We closed out our official evening about 7 p.m., but someone from the class of 1982 — who happened to be having dinner there — was still talking to other alumni.

Board member Dr. Helen Gilmore

Dr. Helen M. Gilmore (89) passed away, August 12, just five days short of her 90th birthday.

Helen was born, August 17, 1932, to the late Edward and Bertha Moore in Lake Worth, FL. She graduated from Lake Worth High (Class of 1950). She then earned a Bachelor's and a Master's Degree from Florida Atlantic University and a Doctorate in Early Childhood Education from Nova Southeastern University. Helen taught at Palm Beach Public School and served as a Specialist for Gifted Education for the Palm Beach School District. She taught as an Adjunct Professor for Nova University for more than 40 years. After retiring from the School District, Helen operated the Helen Gilmore Learning Center, a tutoring center in Lantana. Among other accomplishments Helen was President of the American Association of University Women and also the National Association of Women Business Owners chapter in Palm Beach County. Helen was a licensed pilot and flew the family Cessna 182 and Piper Arrow.

Helen is survived by her husband of 72 years, Harold Gilmore; son, Steve Gilmore (Patricia), of Brisbane, AU; daughters, Janet Washburn (Edgar) and CeCe Skinner, of Ft. Pierce. Also surviving are six grandchildren; and eight great-grandchildren; and two sisters, Linda Moore and Cynthia Moore.

By Ann Carter This was the information shared in the Palm Beach Post, written by Harold Gilmore. While informative, Harold's words miss some of the zest of Helen's life. So I'll share a few things I learned at her funeral. Their son, Steve, talked about his amazing mom and her advice when he married. She said that while togetherness is paramount, a couple also need to spend time apart, even if it's just sitting across the room reading the newspaper. Steve said he now understood all the times he found his father across the room reading the newspaper. Helen's granddaughter, Janelle Washburn, discussed the grandma who never stopped teaching. Trips to the beach included naming things in the car from A-Z. Helen's daughter, CeCe Skinner, talked about her mom's spirit, including going sky diving at age 65. CeCe thought that was great, but didn't understand why Helen had to have her hair done before jumping out of an airplane. (Photographic evidence of the jump was part of the photo montage) Harold shared a conversation when he and Helen were teens, talking about what Helen could do for income when they married. Helen thought she might be a hairdresser, but that career path faded. When their church started a pre-school, Helen thought that might be interesting. Before too long, she

was attending Palm Beach Junior College, then driving her VW Beetle to Boca Raton to complete her degrees up to a Ed.D. We note that these trips preceded Interstate 95, so Helen was driving U.S. 1, Congress and Military Trail to get to FAU.

As their lives and horizons expanded, Harold learned to fly, then Helen got her pilot's license. Harold also pointed out that in all of Helen's endeavors she pushed herself to the top of the heap. As a teacher, she got her doctorate, and eventually became the Gifted Children Specialist for the Palm Beach School District. After opening the Gilmore Learning Center, tutoring in many ways — including helping someone pass his state contractor's exam — she became the president of the county chapter of the National Association of Women Business Owners.

Harold ended with a tale of two students showing up for tutoring at the same time, both with appointments for that time. Helen said she would waive the fee for the time if the two would agree to combined tutoring. She worked with them on adjectives, then asked if they would be nice and use an adjective to describe her. One boy said, "old," while the other said, "wrinkled." Even after all those years in the classroom, Helen could be surprised. And I expect, delighted that the students were honest.

William "Bill" McGoun, 84, died peacefully May 4, 2022, with his son and daughter-in-law by his side in Coral Springs, Fla. Bill is preceded in death by his wife, Bonnie, and parents Edwin and Dorothea McGoun. Left to cherish his memory are his three children, Michael McGoun and wife Adriana, Brandy Knisley, Desiree Ballard and husband Greg, sister Madalyn McGoun, four

grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren, a cousin and host of valued friends and colleagues. Bill was born August 31, 1937,



in New Castle, Pa., and moved to South Florida as a child. He graduated from Lake Worth High School in 1955 and attended Palm Beach Junior College where he discovered his love for writing. He graduated from Florida Atlantic University in 1981 with his Master's degree in Anthropology and graduated from the University of Florida in 1989 with his Ph.D. in Anthropology. He was inducted into Phi Beta Kappa, the oldest and most prestigious honor society in America, in December 1989. He was a committed Gator fan and enjoyed watching games with his son. Bill worked for Fort Lauderdale

News, Miami Herald, Palm Beach Post where he retired and as a Contributing Editor at The Asheville Citizen Times until October 2021. Once retired, Bill and Bonnie moved to the Smoky Mountains (Bryson City). He said many times this was his dream home, a place with a great view and a large inhome library.

Bill and Bonnie experienced all the world had to offer. Even after her passing in 2015, Bill continued his travels visiting his son and family in Coral Springs, cousin Bob in Pensacola, daughters in Dallas, grandson attending MSU -Starkville, MS and a grandson and family in Okinawa.

Bill believed in the power of an education. He loved the arts, music, his family, and books. He volunteered at the Friends of the Marianna Black Library Used Bookstore in Bryson City, NC.
